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


Know someone who needs financial and health management assistance? Seek primary care for health needs at one of our **Inova Cares Clinic for Families (ICCF)** where they will help manage any health issues and assist in the application for an Inova Financial Assistance Program (FAP). The two requirements for Inova's FAP are: (1) residency in Virginia, and (2) income below 400% of the Federal Poverty Level.

If qualified, applicants will be scheduled for a medical appointment and another to begin the FAP application process. ICCF will in turn refer the applicant to the Inova Lions Eye Clinic. Below are the ICCF locations – provide this information to those in need and call the closest clinic to get things started.

Assistive Technology for Blind and Visually-Impaired Individuals

While looking for ideas on Assistive Technology for blind and visually-impaired individuals, I found useful information from the Mobility International USA website (MIUSA), miusa.org/resource.

According to MIUSA, the preferred or needed technology depends on the user's previous training or the type and amount of visual content that is being accessed. The MIUSA Resource page provides details of some of the technologies and associated use cases listed below:

- Screen-reading Software
- Magnification Software
- Dictation Software
- Writing Braille and Using Braille Embossers
- Refreshable Braille Displays
- Optical Character Recognition (OCR) Systems
- Video Magnifiers or Closed-Circuit Televisions (CCTVs)
- Portable Magnifiers

PDG Woody has identified apps for smart-phones and tablets that serve similar purposes. They are listed on Page 16 of this newsletter and will be posted on vleif.org for future reference.

The Scholarship grant committee is eagerly looking forward to finding ways to ensure that all eligible applicants are given equal opportunities to grant funds within our budget limits.

TVIs (Teachers of the Visually Impaired)- Please check the students in your classes for those whom a grant would help open up otherwise untapped possibilities. The applications are on the website, and most of you already know that we will work with you to make sure that all your eligible vision impaired students get considered. If you know of other TVIs that I don't have contact information for, please let me know and I will be happy to include them in my distributions and invitations to the presentation ceremony.

Lions Club Leaders – Get to know the schools in your area and find out who the TVIs (Teachers of the Visually Impaired) are and find out if you can sponsor an eligible applicant. Most of the clubs are familiar with the process and know that there is no downside to this. All of our scholarships are presented with a club acting as sponsor to ensure that grant recipients/families know that without the support of the clubs, this would not be possible. So, if your club is chosen as a sponsor to a grant recipient, please give it serious consideration. The cost is minimal, usually the price of lunch for the parents, if your club can afford it.

District Lions Leadership – We depend on you to help spread the word about what we do, so as you travel around the District, please let the membership know that we are willing to come visit and give presentations to highlight the work that we do for our vision impaired citizens. Our Sight Chair Lion Davida Luehrs is one of our most ardent spokespersons and she has been spearheading the drive for these scholarships for a number of years, and we know she will continue to be the catalyst for the program.

REMEMBER US IN YOUR BUDGET

We could not continue to do what we do without the support of the clubs of our district, and for this we are very thankful. Joe Lipomi Memorial SCHOLASTIC GRANT APPLICATION

<u>Purpose:</u> The Virginia Lions Eye Institute Joe Lipomi Memorial Scholastic Grants are given to qualified visually impaired individuals and sponsored by individual Lions clubs of District 24-L. The overriding objectives of the grants are to enhance the potential for the recipients to achieve an independent, self-supporting life. Grant dollars may be used for assistive devices, educational/training expenses, and other expenses associated with the objectives of the Grants and the recipients in the year in which the grants are received.

Qualifications:

 Visual acuity must be limited to 20/70 or less, best corrected in the best eye or a binocular visual field of 30 degrees or less. Sight must be documented by an eye care professional (Ophthalmologist or Optometrist).

 Sponsorship by a Lions Club with a recommendation by the sponsoring club. VLEI will find a sponsoring club if the applicant needs that service.

3) The Grant Application must be accompanied by a separate Essay explaining why the grant is needed and how the funds will be used, along with the approximate expense. It is helpful if the applicants

"introduce themselves" and describe their interests and objectives for the future. Other than 1) above, the Essay is the only information the Board of Trustees have to distinguish between applicants when the number of applications Exceed the annual budget for Grants. First time applicants receive priority over applications from those who have received previous Grants. Applicants are limited to three years of awards.

<u>Propósito:</u> Las Becas Académicas del Virginia Lions Eye Institute Joe Lipomi Memorial se otorgan a personas con discapacidad visual calificadas que actualmente son estudiantes en un programa académico y son patrocinadas por clubes de Leones individuales del Distrito 24-L. Los objetivos primordiales de las becas son mejorar el potencial de los beneficiarios para lograr una vida independiente y autosuficiente. Los fondos de las becas se pueden utilizar para dispositivos de asistencia, gastos educativos / de capacitación y otros gastos asociados con los objetivos de las becas y los beneficiarios en el año en que estos reciban las becas.

Calificaciones:

 La agudeza visual debe limitarse a 20/70 o menos, mejor corregida en el mejor ojo o en un campo visual binocular de 30 grados o menos. La vista debe ser documentada por un profesional de la vista (oftalmólogo u optometrista).

 Debe tener patrocinio por parte de un Club de Leones con una recomendación del club patrocinador. VLEI encontrará un club patrocinador si el solicitante necesita ese servicio.

3) La solicitud de esta beca debe ir acompañada de <u>un ensavo separado que explique por qué se necesita la beca y cómo se utilizarán los fondos.</u> Es útil si los solicitantes "se presentan" y describen sus intereses y objetivos para el futuro. Aparte del punto 1) anterior, el Ensavo es la única información que los Miembros de la Junta tienen para distinguir entre los solicitantes cuando el número de solicitudes excede el presupuesto anual para las becas. Los solicitantes por primera vez reciben prioridad sobre las solicitudes de aquellos que han recibido becas anteriores.

Update on Program Change from My Eye Doctor

Since April 2016 many clubs in our District have been utilizing **My Eye Doctor** locations in their community to provide exams and glasses for those in need. I set up this partnership and for the clubs based in Fairfax County. There is an opportunity to join the Fairfax Health Department, My Eye Doctor and Lions partnership! If you are not currently participating in this three-way partnership and would like to, please contact me.

For seven years. MED has offered our District a \$30 exam and glasses or \$50 (\$25 for the lens and \$25 for the frame).

MED is updating their program and is requiring that each club that is participating or interested in participating to please contact them. MED now covers the entire east coast and significant portions of the mid part of our country. This great program applies to wherever they are, and Sarah Ulmstead (email below) is the single point of contact. She can enroll you and help address question and issues in a timely manner. Ashley is still the point of contact for billing. She can send your club invoices via email, snail mail or both. Remember that each June your club needs to contact her to make sure she has proper billing information if your leadership has changed.

To stay active in their system, all clubs need to connect with Sarah ASAP to make sure their information is up to date. She will also note your frame choice in their system at that time.

They have had a price increase and are now offering two frame options that Sarah can go over with you. This program was to take effect October 20, 2023.

If at any time issues arise, please know that *I am here to be of help* and invite you to contact me if needed.

BTW, MED has been a wonderful community partner, a frequent donor to the VisionWalk program in multiple states, including for our walk. They also recently donated some used equipment to the new clinic that is opening in Falls Church that I helped coordinate.

Details of the MED program can be provided by Sarah. Each individual club gets to decide what price point they want to use for the frame.

The current plan has not been updated for a few years now

- Exam cost is \$30.00
- Glasses cost \$30.00 Single Vision CR-39 (Plastic material) and Yellow/Orange tag frame

- Currently MED-004 (1841 Fountain Dr. Reston, VA 20190) is the location being utilized
- Frame selection currently is the Orange Tag frames are \$25.00
- New program would add Yellow Tag frames of \$25.00 and Orange Tag frames are \$35.00
- Reston location has 70 Orange Tag frames to choose from

Bottom line, how much will the exam and glasses charge be?

- Exam (\$40.00) + Single Vision (\$25.00) + Yellow Tag frame (\$25.00)
 = \$90.00
- Exam (\$40.00) + Single Vision (\$25.00) + Orange Tag frame (\$30.00)
 = \$95.00

Smartphone Apps for the Visually Impaired

Below are four (4) Smartphone apps and their links that are designed to assist visually-impaired individuals. While there will probably be lots more if you are doing a search, these four have been deemed viable, tested by our Low Vision Specialists and they are free from advertisements. This is for information only; individuals should consult their eyecare professional as to what is best for them.

SEEING AI (Apple/IOS only)

Seeing AI is an artificial intelligence application developed by Microsoft for iOS. Seeing AI uses the device camera to identify people and objects, and then the app audibly describes those objects for people with visual impairment.

ENVISION (Apple/IOS and Android)

SUPERSENSE (Apple/IOS and Android)

Highly-regarded mobile scanner application for blind and visually-impaired users. It is equipped with novel computer vision and machine learning models to help users explore their physical environment and hear about the objects around them. Supersense can automatically detect and read letters, documents, books, currency, barcodes, and more1. It is one of the most downloaded and highest-rated apps for the blind on both App Store and Google Play1. You can download it for free from the App Store or Google Play12.

LOOKOUT (Android only)

Lookout is an initiative by Google that uses computer vision to assist people with low vision or blindness2. It helps users get things done faster and more easily by using the camera of their device2.

Lookout - Assisted Vision is an app available on Google Play Store that uses computer vision to assist people with low vision or blindness3. It makes it easier to get more information about the world around you and do daily tasks more efficiently3.

Low Vision Resource of the Month: <u>National Library Service for the Blind and</u> <u>Print Disabled (NLS)</u>

The most common challenge when one loses vision is they can no longer read normal print. Whether it be books, newspapers, magazines, menus, or even prescription bottles, reading is just no longer possible or very strenuous.

So, what can be done? One option is audio! Many share that using audio allows one to actually "read" much faster. And, the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (NLS), more commonly referred to as the Talking Books Program, is here to help!

NLS offers free audio books (and some magazines!) to anyone unable to read normal print. This service is available in two formats:

1. Talking Books Player – receive a playing machine (about the size of a lunch box) and order books through the mail. Books come in easy-to-handle cartridges. Player is tactile and has large, simple buttons that make it easy to use.



2. BARD (Braille and Audio Recording Download) Mobile App – a free app to download on a smartphone. This allows one to download as many titles as wanted in seconds to minutes. This way gives more flexibility and larger selections. The app mirrors the physical player buttons.

The Talking Books Program is free; however sign-up is required for this incredible program. It is a simple form that needs filled out and signed by a doctor, therapist, counselor, or even librarian.


The Aging Eye – What to Know, What to Do

The month of September is Healthy Aging Month, a time to raise awareness on physical and mental health of older adults and ways to maintain a healthy lifestyle. This is also a great time to talk about changes to our eyes as we age.

Some changes to our sight are normal – most will need reading or prescription glasses as we age. And, we need more light as we age. Additionally, if you live long enough, you will likely get cataracts. The good news is, cataract surgery is readily available and is recognized as a safe surgery today.

However, as we age, our risk for some eye diseases and conditions increases. These include:

• Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) – the part of your retina (in the back of the eye) responsible for central vision, the macula, becomes damaged. This leads to loss of central vision common for reading and driving.



• Glaucoma – a group of diseases that causes damage to the optic nerve that connects the eye to the brain. This takes peripheral, or side, vision. The most common form takes it away slowly over many years. It can be hard to detect without regular eye exams.



• Diabetic Retinopathy – uncontrolled diabetes can cause destruction of the blood vessels in the eye. This can lead to damage on the retina and vision loss.





So, what can we do to preserve our best sight?

1. Get an annual, dilated eye exam. This is the only way to catch eye diseases and conditions before permanent vision loss occurs. And, it is an important tool to manage current conditions as well!

2. Maintain a healthy diet and regular exercise. Dark, leafy greens, omega-3 proteins, and a variety of fruits and vegetables are important for eye health.

Maintaining a healthy weight and healthy heart are important for the eyes as well!

- 3. Stop smoking.
- 4. Manage your diabetes if you have it.

5. Protect your eyes from UV rays from the sun. Wear your sunglasses and broad-brimmed hat!

6. If spending a lot of time on screens, give yourself eye breaks. Every 20 minutes, look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds. This will help with eye strain.

Let's all make sure we keep our best sight this year!

Unless otherwise requested, your Donation will go to support: 1) the Lions Eye Clinic in the Fairfax Hospital Complex; 2) the Joe Lipomi Memorial Scholastic Grants to Visually Challenged students; 3) the Lion's low Vision Learning Center in Alexandria, VA; 4) Dr. Richard A. Falls Research Grants; 5) Eyecare Lane at Moss Free clinic, Fredericksburg, VA.

The Lions Eye Clinic at Fairfax Hospital Complex operates at maximum capacity and performs 4200 examinations and 250 free surgeries on clinic patients in a typical year. These educational and clinical efforts are under the direction of the chief of the Ophthalmology section who is a member of the VLEIF board. Inova Fairfax hospital has provided cost free space and administrative staff for the clinic and operating room use for patients that require surgery since 1974. As of 2021, VLEIF, has purchased over \$900,000 worth of equipment for the clinic since it was established and provides \$25,000 a year for operational expenses.

The Scholastic Grants are awarded annually to the visually challenged students of the district, who are referred by the local Lions Clubs. These grants are intended to increase the potential of the Student to achieve an independent and self-supporting life. For 2020, thirty Joe Lipomi Memorial Grants were approved and were presented to the recipients. Total Value of the Grants \$60,000. Individual Grants may be valued up to \$3,000. VLEIF has awarded over \$500,000 to this population of the district since the inception of the Grant Program.

The Low Vision Learning Center in Old Town Alexandria was established in 2010 in collaboration with the Prevention of Blindness Society of Metropolitan Washington (POB). The Center serves individuals with chronic vision loss, whose vision cannot be improved with conventional glasses or contact lenses. VLEIF donates equipment used to examine patients as well as some of the different visual aids used for rehabilitation.

A research grant has been established in the name of Dr. Richard A. Falls that is designed to encourage research by eligible participants to enhance the treatment of eyecare. \$40,000.00 Annually has been set aside for this effort.
